

Albert C. 'Champ' Weatherill Jr., 62, Vietnam War vet; retired PECO boilermaker

Albert C. "Champ" Weatherill Jr., 62, of the Boothwyn section of Upper Chichester, a retired PECO boilermaker and decorated Vietnam War veteran, died June 29 at home.

Born, reared and educated in Delaware County, Mr. Weatherill graduated from Interboro High School in 1967.

He was a proud and decorated veteran of a brown water Navy unit during the Vietnam War, serving aboard the USS Washita County LST 1166.

Mr. Weatherill retired from PECO, where he worked as a boilermaker in the nuclear maintenance division.

He moved to Boothwyn in 1978 and was a member of American Legion Post 951 in the Ogden section of Upper Chichester and the VFW in Ridley Township.

An avid fisherman and outdoorsman, Mr. Weatherill was a founding member of the local chapter of the Brotherhood of the Jungle Cock, an organization that promotes fishing, conservation and preservation.

He was a proud and loving grandfather of five and enjoyed photography and woodworking.

Mr. Weatherill was the son of the late Albert C. Weatherill and brother of the late Steven Weatherill.
